## 3 OUR FINANCES

Given the global pandemic, the effect it had on our financial position generated a reduction to the budgetary resources beginning the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2020, a 28.3343% reduction to the net available for appropriation. In the same quarter with the global pandemic worsening, our budgetary resources were further reduced to 48.1635%. As a result, a proportionate reduction in the allotment authority of 48.1635% was implemented across the board.

## Accomplishments and Challenges

- The Office of Management and Budget acquired a budget software through Questica to assist us in Maximizing efficiency in the formulation and transformation of our CNMI Budget by eliminating time consuming spreadsheets. The Questica Budget Software is designed to streamline the budgeting process (planning, management, reporting, and sharing) for public sector entities. Fiscal Year 2019 was the first budget submission using Questica and its successful implementation of this Service as a Software allowed us to submit our budget ahead of the April 1 deadline. OMB will continue to use Questica until such time that the CNMI upgrades the AS400, JDEdwards Financial Management System.
- OMB embarked in a mission to build capacity by mandating positions to be filled by qualified applicants who have graduated from an accredited college or university with a Bachelor's degree in the field of finance, accounting or business management. Of the seven staff of OMB four (4) are business management majors with a concentration in accounting and one (1) with an Associate of Arts in Accounting.
- In the last two fiscal years, the OMB processed multiple allotments and reprogramming actions, including requests for personnel actions for both federal and local programs. To track our performance measures, we created a daily log for all incoming requests and the volume of requests as illustrated in the table below. This tool used by OMB helps us to track documents that we received, when they were processed and when and who picked up the documents. OMB's main goal is to ensure all requests submitted are processed within three days that is reached our office.

- In August 2020, five of the OMB staff joined the APIPA 2020 virtual conference with the ability to earn up to 10 certificates, all of which relate to upgrading our financial management skills while on the job training during a pandemic environment.
- Besides our normal duties as OMB, we also support multiple programs as a result of the disaster. During the month of September, OMB met with all subrecipients of Mangkhut and Yutu to provide assistance on the best approach to effectively implement the projects that were awarded by FEMA for the repair or replacement of damage public facilities and their contents.
- OMB was challenged in the last fiscal year with the shutdown resulting from the pandemic, our budget submissions in April and July, and the introduction, passage, and disapproval of S.B. 21-33 to permanently place OMB under the Department of Finance amongst other issues. We prevailed because of the administration's support together with the members who voted to keep OMB under the umbrella of the administration.
